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Background

Since December 2013, there have been constant engagements with both the Fluoride and Arsenic networks trying to bring water quality related health problems to the forefront in Assam and trying to get more and more institutions and people interested in it.

The first of these engagements was a team from the Fluoride Knowledge and Action Network visiting Assam from 9-14 Dec 2013. The main aim of this initiative was to talk to important entities in the state that included government departments, NGOs and others to work closely on the issue and forming a regional alliance to work on Fluorosis.

There were a series of meetings that the team had with different stakeholders during this first visit, important among these were; meetings with the Director WSSO, the Principal Secretary to the Chief Minister, the secretary PHED, the Director NHRM, Coordinator UNICEF and representatives from regional NGO's i.e. Centre for Microfinance and Livelihoods (CML) and Environ.

Besides engaging with different stakeholders the team also made a field visit to Nagaon District and gave a set of recommendations to the government based on the visit as well.

A communications campaign, "Unite for Water, Unite for Assam", was launched by the Network from August 15, 2014. The purpose of the campaign was to get the issue out in the open and to take it to wherever it could, i.e schools, colleges, government offices, non-governmental organisations. First activities of this campaign happened with a visit to Assam and a few initial sessions in colleges to make young people understand what Fluorosis was.

In September 2014, the Arsenic Knowledge and Action Network organised a round-table inviting important stakeholders to deliberate upon the activities that the Arsenic Network could undertake up in the coming time. The round table highlighted needs such as communication reassessment and planning along with a collection of existing knowledge and building capacity of existing partners to take forward action.

There have been a series of discussions series in Jorhat and Tezpur organised by the Arsenic Network where academia, affected communities, governmental representatives and people with interest on the issue have come together to bring forward their views on what they've been involved with and what they think might help.

To advance existing initiatives to the next level, the two Networks felt that it was now time to provide a structure to activities and efforts so as to enable concerted action and a progression towards concrete interventions.

This began with a one week Consultation programme by the Networks in Assam.





Discussion Briefs of each meeting

In all, five separate meetings were conducted in the week 9-12 March 2015. The overall purpose was to bring a momentum to water quality and related health issues in the state with both shorter term measures as well as contributing to building institutions which can contribute in the longer run.

Pathways Ahead

The pathway that lies ahead in Assam for the water quality movement started by the two Networks is for establishing a wider forum around water quality and to give this forum a platform to act.

- We see a resource centre on water quality as being one such platform which not only binds all efforts on water quality but also enables different actors to organize and collect together, access as well as use all information and act. As of now the Centre for Microfinance and Livelihoods (CML) in Guwahati has agreed to incubate the centre for a period of one year.
 - As we go further along the road we see the resource centre constantly being fed with information that would come in through different actors and the information being made available being used by a variety of actors for their different purposes
- 2. Better communication with all stakeholders was an important need expressed by the Water as well as Health departments. We plan to enable this through a partnership with these departments in several Water quality affected districts. The idea is to engage with existing government efforts, understand the communication gaps and try to fill it, in order to evolve a communication strategy for Water quality issues in Assam. Eco Concepts would be coordinating this activity on behalf of the networks.
- 3. The placement of this Resource centre within the current institutional landscape of Assam is important. An initial study of institutions and their roles will be done to bring out what is already happening on this front in Assam and how we could come in to bring out a focused effort. Aaranyak will be coordinating this effort on behalf of the networks.
- 4. Finally, as advisor to both the networks in Assam, Mr A B Paul and his team, comprising dedicated persons such as Mr Dharani Saikia are the backbone of the network effort in Assam. They provide linkage to the issues faced by communities and explore newer affected places across the state.

With this dedicated group of people in Assam, helped by individuals such as Dr Ruby Kotoky, Mr Rushabh Hemani, Dr Arundhati Deka, Mr Nripendra Sarma, and others, the Water quality team of Assam is in able hands.

Appendix 1: Detailed notes of all meetings

Civil Society Consultation on Water quality on the 10th of March, 2015

Background

What's been missing in Assam so far, as far as initiatives on Water quality are concerned particularly those that affect rural people is well thought out messages going out clearly to policy makers on what needs to be done.

With water quality problems reaching their peak, we think now is the time the messages need to go out strongly and like-minded people needed to come out in the open and do something.

The civil society consultation on the 10th in Guwahati was held keeping this very purpose in mind; so a variety of thoughts could come together as one for discussing ways forward.

There were people from all fields; Academia, researchers, NGO's, media and students. People who came shared their own unique perspectives on what they felt can be done

The Sessions

The sessions were a mix of things; to start with there was a brief session on what the issue was and what it meant. A brief run through of activities of the two Networks for people to get a sense of what they were involved with at the moment..

This was followed by three separate group discussions on Fluoride, Arsenic and other water quality problems. People participated in different groups to discuss possibilities that existed in Assam.

In the end a possible framework of efforts that were possible was presented to the group

What came out of it?

What came out of the event was a need, a need to act and put up a front to counter the water quality problem in Assam. The idea of a resource centre on water quality came to the forefront during discussions.





Health training for Medical Doctors on the 12th of March, 2015

Background

Within the medical curriculum, water related diseases such as Fluorosis and Arsenicosis are much neglected subjects. As a result, there are very few trained health practitioners who are able to detect these diseases, can offer counseling support to patients.

In fact even a bare minimum starting point; a health survey that can detect the extent of these diseases in communities isn't possible at the moment..

Taking this into account, the two Networks on Fluoride and Arsenic joined hands and brought two eminent doctors who have worked extensively on these diseases for decades.

The two doctors, Dr Raja Reddy, and Dr. Kunal Kanti Majumdar are renowned in their respective fields of understanding fluorosis and arsenecosis respectively.

Dr. Raja Reddy is an eminent Neurosurgeon, a practicing doctor at Apollo Hospitals and also one of the foremost experts on Skeletal Fluorosis.

Dr Kunal Kanti Majumdar is one of the leading Arsenecosis experts who is practicing at KPC Medical College and Hospital, Kolkata besides participating in numerous Arsenic mitigation efforts with UNICEF and other agencies.

The training

The two aspects that this training focused on were how to detect and mitigate Fluorosis and Arsenecosis.

There were presentations which the two specialists on Fluorosis and Arsenecosis made followed by interactions with those present.

What greatly worked for the workshop was the range of questions that were put forward to the two experts

The interactions were immensely useful as it helped the medical professionals who attended get basic insights into dealing with the two problems.

What came out?

Doctors/ Medical professionals who attended this training found this training to be very useful and expressed a need for the network assisting them with detecting the problem in the field on a sustainable basis. Universities and doctors agreed to take up further detailed training so as to enable more informed action against the diseases related to the water quality problems.





Meeting with Government on the 11th of March, 2015

Background

To build upon deliberations that took place with civil society actors as well as to give strength to the idea of the resource centre which had germinated at the civil society consultation; a meeting was organized with select government departments

It was felt that for any efforts to be sustainable government were needed as able partners

The meeting

The idea of a "State water quality and health resource centre" as a multi-stakeholder initiative which could give shape to efforts in Assam through a converged institutional structure was put forward to the group here.

What came out?

Unfortunately because of the meeting coinciding with an overall government web-conference that day which all department heads, secretaries had we could only have a small group to attend, consisting mostly of some WSSO staff, a few PHED Officials as well as a former PHED Secretary.

Those present unanimously felt that having a resource centre on water quality was a step in the right direction and that the government departments had an important role to play in it.





Meeting with UNICEF on March 13 2015

Background

A summary meeting was held in UNICEF Guwahati at the end of all other meetings as a wrapping up and summarizing with key persons of Guwahati. It was attended by Mr Partho Patwari, Mr Partha Jyoti Das, Dr Chandan Mahanta, Mr A B Paul, Mr Rushabh Hemani and network secretariat members.

The meeting

Key discussions of the meetings were put forward here. It was felt to now focus on what can be done in the next one year and how the suggestions in these meetings could be taken ahead.

What came out?

The areas which came out of this summary were:

- a) The need for the Water quality and health resource centre
- b) Advocacy and technical/field support to cover more blocks for data testing
- c) Develop a communication strategy for water quality issues giving a sense of possibility
- d) Coordinating with the public health and medical side of the problem
- e) Visiting other states and institutions such as DFMC Nalgonda to learn and utilize
